The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy

Based on the late Douglas Adams' best selling cult classic, *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy* is the story of one Earthman (Arthur Dent) and his best friend (Ford Prefect) from a planet "somewhere in the vicinity of Betelgeuse". Arthur and Ford narrowly escape the destruction of Earth to make way for an intergalactic bypass, and eventually hitch a ride on the ship of Zaphod Beeblebrox, the President of the Galaxy (who has kidnapped himself).
